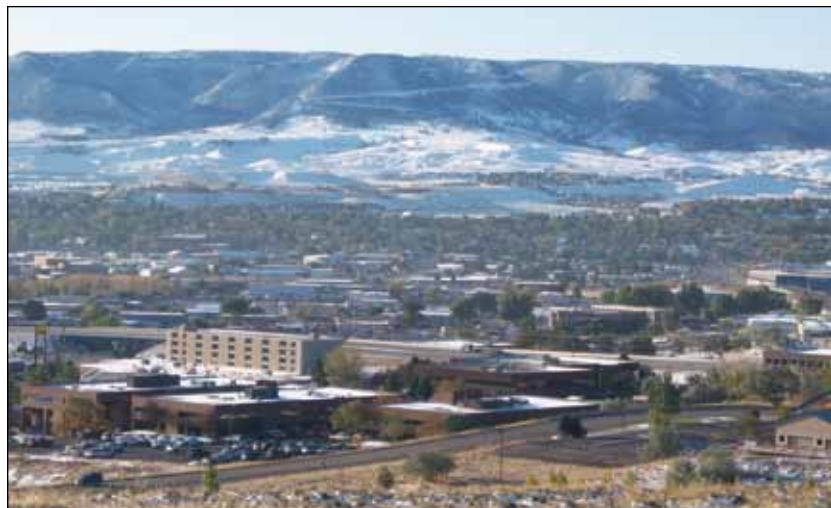

It has been a busy and active year for CAEDA. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your ongoing support of CAEDA's economic development efforts and to reflect on some major accomplishments that have taken place this year.

As the CAEDA board chairman, I am impressed with the organization's ability to move quickly and adapt to the changing needs of the community. We continue to structure our committees to identify community problems and develop plans to address them. Our Infrastructure and Development Task Force has been working diligently to bring together the top players in infrastructure to discuss issues and ways to remedy them.

Another accomplishment that has taken place this year is the continued expansion of the Casper Area Business Innovation Center. DeAnna Adams was named the Director and will be taking an active role in the planning and design of the facility. Since the worldwide demand for English instruction is so strong, Eleutian plans to hire up to 500 new employees over the next 5 years.

Marketing our community remains a top priority for CAEDA. The staff has been very active this year representing Casper at various events including the national Windpower 2010 Expo in Dallas and Westpack in Anaheim. CAEDA continues to publish the *Community Data Book*, *CAEDA Directions* newsletters and *Casper-Natrona County Manufacturing & Industrial Directory* in-house. The staff also contributes articles and advertisements to numerous publications and produces targeted mailings throughout the year. 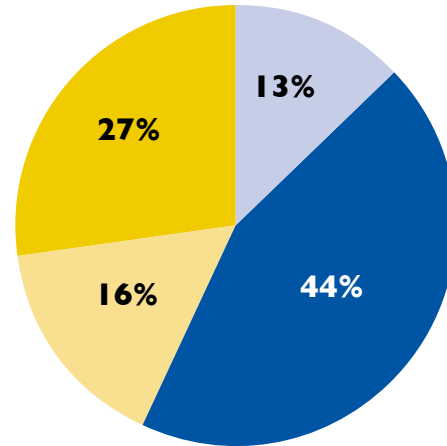

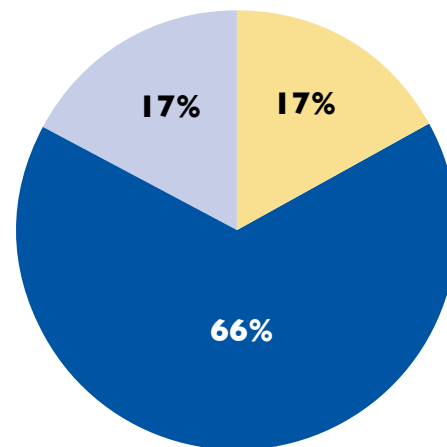

LETTER from the DIRECTOR of the CASPER AREA BUSINESS INNOVATION CENTER

Dear Forward Casper Investors and Community Members,

The Casper Area Business Innovation Center, a business incubator, is now on target for an opening date in early 2012. Several milestones were met during 2010. The Design Development and Construction Documents were completed. The Construction Bid Opening will be held in late December with construction to start in January 2011.

Once completed, the Innovation Center will be the corporate headquarters for start-up companies in the city of Casper and Natrona County. While they reside within the Innovation Center, companies will have access to state-of-the-art conferencing facilities and a business work center complete with all the necessary equipment needed for successful day-to-day business operations. Each company office will be furnished with the basics of desks and chairs.

But, the most important component of a business incubator is the daily accessibility of a professional staff with the willingness and knowledge to help smooth the way through the multitude of issues, problems and decisions of starting and running a business. Each client in the Innovation Center will have a mentoring group of service providers who will be knowledgeable in all aspects of business ownership. This mentoring group will be industry specific as well as include general business partners. Workshops and training events as well as informal networking opportunities will be held monthly. Confidential oversight of business operations will be ongoing with the staff being proactive in helping companies grow towards their graduation date. Once a company has completed the milestones set for them by their mentoring group, usually between three to five years, the company will graduate into the city of Casper and Natrona County community. Once again, by partnering with the real estate agencies in the area, a suitable office will be located for the graduating company.

This will not be the end of our relationship with our graduates. They will in turn become mentors and supporters of our program.

We will continue to track their success and provide this information to our community partners in our annual economic impact reports.

We are currently working to revitalize our website and invite you to “watch us grow” as construction begins to take place and the transformation of the AMOCO Building becomes a reality.

OPTIONAL ONE CENT TAX



The Optional One Cent Tax came up for renewal in 2010. The Optional One Cent general purpose tax was put into effect in 1974 and voters have reapproved it ever since. Recognizing the importance of this tax to Natrona County's economic development, the Casper Area Chamber of Commerce and CAEDA took the initiative this year to lead the Optional One Cent Tax Campaign for Natrona County.

CAEDA Board of Directors passed a resolution to support the One Cent Campaign through donations, matching funds and serving on the One Cent Committee. The One Cent Committee consisted of Jim Porter, Kevin Sadler, Lori Becker, Robert Barnes and Noelle Wernsman.



A "One Cent Kick-Off" event was held at Jonah Bank on April 27th where Evansville Mayor Phil Hinds, among other speakers, highlighted the various benefits of the One Cent to the local community.

Throughout the summer, the Casper Area Chamber of Commerce and CAEDA spoke at many other events and meetings to inform the public of the advantages of the tax. At these events, it was noted that all communities within Natrona County rely on the tax for numerous

reasons such as water main replacement, building repairs and equipment replacement, street projects, parks and trails, fire and police, and many other beneficial projects.

The Casper Area Chamber of Commerce and CAEDA also noted that historically, approximately more than 50% of the One Cent Tax has always gone to infrastructure and approximately 25% goes to special projects that help make our communities thrive with unique attractions such as the Platte River Parkway trail systems, the Casper Events Center and the Ice Arena.

Additionally, there were several marketing strategies utilized for this campaign. The Chamber of Commerce and CAEDA worked together at a booth at the Annual NicFest. Balloons, tote bags and information were shared with Natrona County residents while volunteers manned the booth. The One Cent Committee also placed advertisements in many locations such as movie theaters, billboards, television, radio and Facebook. They also designed and distributed yard signs and direct mailings.

The efforts of the Casper Area Chamber of Commerce and CAEDA proved successful as 70% of the Natrona County voters approved the Optional One Cent Tax during the general election held on November 2.



Natrona County remained a popular area for companies and site selectors to consider as they searched for locations to expand or grow existing operations. CAEDA staff was happy to assist them in their evaluation of the community by researching data, hosting site visits and making introductions to community leaders.

Bridger Steel

Bridger Steel, headquartered in Bozeman, Montana, recently established a branch in Evansville. The company manufactures one of the best selections of rustic metal siding and roofing products in the U.S. This 14-year-old company was founded on the concept of selling directly to the customer in order to maintain control of quality and price. With three locations in Montana and one in South Dakota, the Evansville location is its fifth facility.



Earlier this year, Wyoming-based Eleutian Technology recently announced the opening of a new teaching facility in Casper. The company selected the Granite Peak Business Center at the McMurry Business Park for its operations and had a grand opening event in June.

Eleutian Technology



Eleutian provides online language instruction for international businesses and educational institutions that are primarily located in Korea, Japan and China. The worldwide demand for English instruction is strong and Eleutian is working to meet this growing need through their innovative technology. With the use of interactive video conferencing, teachers in Wyoming work directly with students in Asia in either one-on-one or group settings.

This spring, CAEDA worked with the Eleutian staff to find potential locations for their center. CAEDA also supported Eleutian's Pre-Hire Economic Development Grant Application with the Department of Workforce Services. Thanks to the grant, Casper College and Eleutian have now partnered to provide free training to teaching candidates. The Casper teaching center began with 120 employees but hopes to expand to 500.

Leslie Blythe and Doug Mollet of Rocky Mountain Power discussed wind development in the region as well as economic development specifics related to their industry at the CAEDA Spring Quarterly Breakfast. At the Summer Quarterly Breakfast Meeting, Lori Becker, Executive Director of the Casper Area Chamber of Commerce, spoke of how the Chamber aids our community through its five core goals. She also reviewed the ways in which the Chamber helps to create a strong, local economy – Casper Cash, the Business Challenge, the Industry and Technology Expo, networking and training opportunities and the Optional One Cent Tax Campaign. At the Fall Quarterly Breakfast Meeting, Tom Cannon and Angelo Kallas of Cameco Resources, one of the world's largest uranium producers, presented an overview of Cameco's Smith Ranch/Highland (SRH) facility. This facility uses in-situ mining technology to recover uranium and is the largest U.S. in-situ uranium mine, which is located approximately 50 miles east/northeast of Casper in Converse County.

QUARTERLY NEWSLETTERS

Another popular investor benefit is *CAEDA Directions*, CAEDA's quarterly newsletter. This publication provides informative business articles, tracks local economic progress and highlights community successes throughout the year. CAEDA also submits an article to the Chamber of Commerce monthly newsletter for an even greater local audience.

CAEDA, in addition, represents the community by publishing articles, issuing press releases and placing advertisements in a wide variety of media publications. CAEDA's website, www.casperworks.biz, is updated on a regular basis with the most current data, Targeted Industry studies and other news that is accessible at any time.

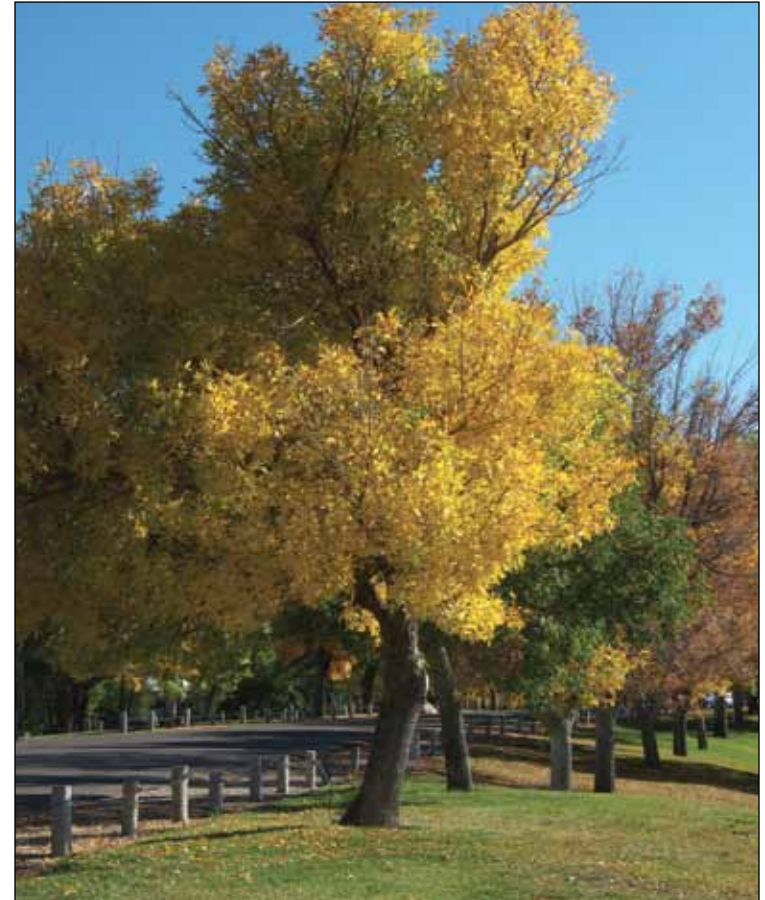

TRADE SHOWS

Westpack

In February, CAEDA staff helped the Wyoming Business Council with its booth at the Westpack show in Anaheim, California. This conference and exhibition presented the latest advances in packaging and processing including machinery and machinery components, containers, materials, custom automation technology and robotics.

Windpower 2010

In May, thousands of people flocked to Dallas, Texas to attend Windpower 2010, the largest wind conference and exhibition in the U.S. This event is organized by the American Wind Energy Association (AWEA) and is sponsored by some of the biggest names in renewable energy including GE Energy, Vestes, Gamesa and Siemens. Because of these factors, Windpower 2010 offered excellent opportunities to learn about the rapidly expanding wind industry.

CAEDA staff represented Natrona County at the Wyoming Business Council booth. For CAEDA, the wind turbine industry is a top economic development priority. Casper's manufacturing base is well-suited to the industry that offers extraordinary growth potential, job creation, industry diversification and high wage levels. Having a presence at the show enabled CAEDA to emphasize the benefits of turbine manufacturing to a receptive target audience and learn more about the burgeoning wind industry.

CONFERENCES

Wyoming Economic Development Association (WEDA) Conferences

CAEDA staff members attended two WEDA conferences: the Winter Conference held in Cheyenne from February 9-10 in conjunction with the Wyoming Legislative Session; and the Fall Conference in Riverton held August 17-18. Our President and CEO, Robert Barnes, hosted the event as the WEDA Board President. Mr. Barnes introduced each of the speakers and presented awards at this conference. State and national economic development issues were discussed at both conferences.
